Security Deposit Demand Letter

Your letter to request a security deposit is on page 3. Before you fill out your letter, you will need to figure out how much interest you earned on your security deposit.

You get 1% interest on your security deposit per year. To figure out how much interest you get, you need to know:

- how much your security deposit was, and
- how many months you lived in your rental.

You need to do some math to figure out your interest. You will use the **TOTAL DEPOSIT** number in your letter.

1) Figure out the interest for 1 year:

After You Finish Your Letter:

Print your letter

If your computer is connected to a printer, you can print this form at any time by clicking on "File," then selecting "Print" from the drop down menu. You may also print by pressing "p" while holding down the "Ctrl" key. If you don't have a printer, you can find one at a library.

• Don't date, sign or send the form until after the deadline

Has it been three weeks since you moved out AND gave your landlord a forwarding address (or other delivery instructions)? If not, wait until the deadline has passed before you sign, date or mail the form.

• Sign the letter, make copies, and mail it

Once you have signed and dated the letter, you should make copies and keep at least one for yourself. After you have done that – and the three week deadline has passed – mail the letter to the landlord.

Since you have failed to fulfill these obligations, Minnesota Statute §504B.178(4) allows me to sue to recover the portion of the deposit and interest illegally withheld, and, as a penalty, an amount equal to this amount, as well as court costs. In addition, Minnesota Statute §504B.178(7) allows me to recover up to \$500 for bad faith retention of my security deposit. In this case, that amount would be between \$_____ and \$_____, plus court costs. (Minimum Penalty) (Maximum Penalty) I would, however, prefer to settle this issue out of court. Therefore, please send me my full security deposit plus interest, as noted above, to the above address within five days. If you fail to comply with my request, I will take court action to recover the full amount plus the penalties and punitive damages authorized by Minnesota Statutes. Signature Date
